

It will be imperative that we have a large show of members on site to construct and maintain a professional display of this proportion as it will be necessary for the club to monitor the display from Wednesday thru and including Sunday. For this event to be successful we will have to offer our services to assure fulfillment of our responsibility for maintaining the display in return for the \$1500.00 to be added to our treasury. Turk Russell has agreed to manage this complex project. Jeffrey Johnstonbaugh has offered to participate in the extensive landscaping required. Your responsibility as a club member will be to assure success thru active participation. Planning for this event began in October involving planning meetings with the Farm Show Committee together with constant phone communication addressing various layout details. We will need members to address the following construction details:

- 1. Track construction and elevation development

- 3. Unloading of trailer and transporting contents to area of development
- 4. Distribution of mulch and placement of plant material
- 5. Distribution of buildings and accessories
- 6. Cleanup and teardown



Railroad Inventions Created by Women Inventors


In 1870, Eliza Murfey patented 16 devices for improving the packing of journals and bearings for railroad-car axles. These packings were used to lubricate the axles with oil which reduced derailments caused by seized axles and bearings. In 1879, Mary Walton developed a method of deflecting smoke stack emissions through water tanks and later adapted the system for use on locomotives. In the 1880s, many cities developed a mass transit system using noisy elevated trains. To reduce the noise, Walton invented a sound-dampening system that cradled the track in a wooden box lined with cotton and then filled with sand. She received a patent for the system on February 8, 1881, and later sold the rights to the Metropolitan Railroad of New York City. Other inventions by women included a railway crossing gate by Mary I. Riggin and several patents for the construction of railway tracks by Catherine L. Gibbon.





Don's Technical Corner

USA Trains: The new die cast GG1 debuted these past October at the York TCA Show. This is a scale model weighting 45 lbs. There is a carrying handle which is bolted to the top of the Loco to help in lifting. The model comes with the highest level of detail and a QSI sound system. The model is available in Amtrak, PC and various Pennys paint schemes. Pricing is around \$1,600.






Next is the new Alco S4 available in many road names. This Loco is slightly larger than the NW-2 for a comparison. This loco has many detail upgrades and includes the new fan driven smoke unit. It is now available and sells for \$190. The new SD-70 should be available by the end of the year. The Pennys B6 Loco has been delayed for one year after the Big Boy is released.

Aristo Craft has this remote control 1:30 scale crane available, sells for \$90. This is a wireless remote control device and runs on AA batteries for the crane and the remote control transmitter.

ARISTO CRAFT TRAINS: Live Steam Mikado will be available December 1 and more road names by December 15th.

Re-issue of first run cars with upgrades. In mid-December we are receiving a shipment of 16 different 46000 Series Steel Boxcars and 46200 Series Steel Reefers. We have lowered the floors on these cars to a scale height and added "see through" roof walks, we thought this would be a good time to re-issue some of



our earlier versions of cars and bring some of the best sellers back to the marketplace.


